SPEEDING



Residents are completely fed up with the flouting of speed limits in and around the village – and rightly so! In the future, vehicle registrations will be passed to NHW and the Police. Drop your speed – save fuel and save lives!

SLUG PELLETS

Please be careful when exercising your dogs on the footpaths around fields, as any slug pellets that have been spread are lethal to dogs and can kill them within hours. If your dog eats these pellets, they will froth at the mouth. Go straight to the vet. It has happened to our dogs in the past; by doing this they survived.

COUNTY LINES ARRESTS

Suffolk Constabulary had taken part in a national week of action against the on-going threat of drug dealing. Officers made 19 arrest, including offences for possession with intent to supply drugs. Drugs recovered were worth around $\pm 11,500$ with cash of $\pm 4,500$. They also seized 10 weapons including knives, crossbows and knuckledusters.

The force also carried out 43 welfare and safeguarding visits to properties which have been historically associated with dealing drugs. 30 vulnerable adults and children were spoken to terms of safeguarding measures.

County Lines is a term used to describe gangs and criminal networks establishing a drug market in rural towns and exploiting children and vulnerable adults to move and store the drugs and money, often by use of intimidation and violence.

DOGS OFF THE LEAD

Back in the Autumn, an incident was reported of a lady walking her dog along the field edge of Mill Road. Two black retrievers appeared from nowhere and chased her small dog all the way to Peter's Pond. The gentleman was asked to keep his dogs under control. Please keep all dogs on leads and under control. Thank you.

Meeting report – 3rd March 2022

At the last meeting of the parish council, a strategic plan was started. It is a list of actions and activities that the Parish Council would like to undertake and will be developed in the next few months. Items such as electric charging points, developing the play equipment in pocket park, new benches and dog waste bins, setting up a footpaths review, and how to better communicate with the public are all on the list. In future months, the Council will be organising a survey to get more ideas.

The Council applied for a substantial grant of £4000 to develop the area around the village hall and create a meeting space and garden for all. If successful, the Parish Council will contribute £1000 to the work. Council is also planning to apply for a grant to install a projector/sound system and screen at the Village Hall.

Planning application to construct a Hay and Straw Barn on land adjacent to the stables at a property in Orchard Rise was supported by Councillors.

The ROSPA report into Pocket Park is being reviewed and decisions made at the next meeting.

Following the retirement of the Clerk/RFO (Sue Piggott), Council decided to offer the post to a new applicant who, it is hoped, will start in April.

Next meeting Thursday 28_{th} April 6.30 pm in the Village Hall. All members of the public are welcome.

Badingham Parish Council is looking for new Councillors

In recent months, things have been changing for the parish council. Two new Councillors – Maurice Bowe and Thomas Mountain - have been co-opted. The new chair of the Council is Sonia Frost and after many years' service and hard work, the Clerk, Sue Piggott, retired. Caroline Emery has been appointed to join us in April as the Clerk/RFO.

But, we need 4 more Councillors in order to be up to full quota.

So, what does a Parish Councillor do?

Basically, look after and make decisions about local community assets and issues – for instance

- looking after the Pocket Park and its equipment
- ensuring that footpaths and verges are maintained
- providing benches, dog bins, and rubbish bins
- liaising with Suffolk Highways about road problems
- making recommendations about planning applications (note East Suffolk District Council have the final say!)
- putting on community events
- providing grants to local community organisations
- providing green initiatives for instance an electric charging point
- providing notice boards and a website
- developing relationships to be a lynchpin between the community, other groups in the area and the District and County Councils

And that is not an endless list. The list of powers that a parish council has is pages long from buying town clocks, maintaining war memorials and donating to the maintenance of the burial grounds.

Badingham Parish Council is wanting to move forward with new ideas and ways to work within the community but **we need more Councillors to do it**. At the last meeting, we started to develop a plan of improvements and actions for the village. This included items such as:

- Improving the area around the Village Hall into a community garden space.
- Installing an electrical car charging point and working on green/environmental initiatives
- Setting up a footpath working party to monitor and develop the footpaths
- Investigate the needs for more dog waste bins, benches and possibly a bus shelter.

The actual work in organising and administrating the Council is mostly done by the Clerk but Badingham PC would like to have enough Councillors that could represent

the Council in other areas. For instance, appointing a Trustee of the Village Hall, assigning a Councillor to look after the land assets as well as Pocket Park, have a Councillor attend meetings of the PCC.

How much work is it?

There is normally one meeting per month which lasts about 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ - 2 hours. There is reading to do to be ready for the meeting and you may put yourself forward to take on a task outside the meeting. Every 4 years there are elections where, if you wish to, you stand for re-election.

Why do it?

As a Councillor, you will be able to influence the Council on the issues that you think are important and raise items to be discussed. You will be able to pass on comments and suggestions and complaints that you have received in your day-to-day life in the village and feedback to individuals what the result was. Sometimes, Parish Councillors attend planning meetings at East Suffolk District Council to make representations on behalf of Council or work with Highways to improve the roads and environment. There is also a chance to be involved in raising grants for village improvements.

The role of Parish Councillor is unpaid but there is a lot of satisfaction to be gained when people in the village appreciate the Council for something that has been completed.

Who can be a Councillor?

Basically, as long as you live or work in or within 3 miles of the parish, are on the electoral register and don't have a criminal record, you can apply. If you still aren't sure, then talk to one of the current Councillors or best still, come to a meeting. The public are always welcome. Our website, currently under review, has information about the meetings and the other Councillors.

How to apply

Contact the Clerk or the Chair or Vice-Chair of the Council who will talk things through with you. Once you are happy to apply, then we would appreciate a short summary of why you are interested. Once you are co-opted or elected to Council, training will be provided and you'll find us a friendly bunch.

Memories of Dr. Kate Evans

It was with great sadness that we learned of the death on 14th January 2022 of a dear friend, Dr. Kate Evans, aged 93. Kate was a well-known and extremely respected resident within Badingham for many years, before moving to Pakefield and then to Dawlish in Devon.

For those who were privileged to know her, Kate, who was born in Accrington, Lancashire, was quite simply one of a kind – always fiercely independent, very determined and even when troubled with mobility problems, she didn't allow it to deter her from her love of gardening or swimming, especially in the sea, or her lifelong sense of adventure and the joy of travel.

Mildly eccentric perhaps, in the best possible way, she had a mischievous sense of fun and often a twinkle in her eye if something sparked her interest. Her cottage home in Badingham was called 'Lop Sop Tung' – Chinese for dustbin we believe, which was a good indication of her sense of humour. Her home was re-named 'Kate's Cottage' in her honour when she left Badingham.

Kate was always honest saying exactly what she thought – straight and to the point if she disagreed with a particular point of view. One knew exactly where one was with Kate, which was so refreshing.

Extremely well read and knowledgeable on so many levels, with a keen interest in philosophy and semantics, Kate taught

7th March 1928 – 14th January 2022 history for many years at Mills Grammar School, Framlingham. Ex-pupil, Bridget Heriz, artist and sculptor, who was also a previous resident of Badingham and her good friend, recalled Kates's love of life and that whilst teaching Kate gained a sabbatical to India. Upon her return to Mills Grammar, she presented herself each day wearing the various forms of Indian attire that a traveller to the country would encounter, giving her students a flavour and inspirational insight into the country she had visited. Following her time at Mills Grammar, Kate lectured at Homerton Training College, Cambridge then gained an MA and PhD at University College London. Kate was always studying, writing and learning throughout something her life. she always encouraged in others - age was never to be used as a barrier or as an excuse.

After she retired from teaching, as a very keen gardener, she gardened for guite a number of years at the Old Rectory, Badingham when it was known as the TM (Transcendental Meditation) Centre and was always happy to pass on to others her extensive knowledge and advice on all things horticultural. An advocate of self-sufficiency and vegetarianism, she was an environmentalist long before it became fashionable. She loved animals and was concerned that mankind was making a mess of and mistreating the planet we all share. We spent many an hour at her cottage discussing various issues of the day trying to put the world to

rights. During this period Kate wrote *Themselves Amazed'*, an extraordinarily extensive, erudite and imaginative exploration of evolved human behaviour through "inquiry into the nature of human languages, conducted through the medium of English".

Many of her friends from Kate's earliest days living and working in Suffolk were artists, including Audrey Pilkington at Clock House Art Centre in Bruisyard, Angela Goshen at Bruisyard Hall and especially Peter and Millie Davies who lived at Shawsgate in the 1960s.

Wherever she resided. Kate was an active and enthusiastic participant and supporter of her local community. She was not adverse to writing numerous letters to councils, and those deemed to be in authority, if she felt her community was being threatened by cuts to services - especially bus services - or being inappropriately overdeveloped. As a Badingham resident she wrote articles for the Badingham Echo, arranged beautiful walks and planted, as part of the Millennium Project, daffodils and snowdrops on our village verges which flourish each spring.

Whilst residina in Pakefield she volunteered her services to the local library and led the battle to save her village green, which succeeded. She passionate was about equality. individuality, social justice and fair play and was never afraid, however unpopular, to put her head above the parapet and speak out for the causes she believed in.

Sue Bennett (nee Taft) also one of Kate's pupils who had moved to Devon. remembered how she and Kate thoroughly enjoyed their shared trips to Paignton Zoo and Shaldon's Little Zoo or visiting Taunton Museum to see the Saxon Torc their trips _ alwavs concluding with local ice cream being carefully and expertly eaten, with Kate "cleanly catching every drip".

Sue wrote that "Kate would want to be remembered for her love of life, of history, literature and travel", and the very strong memory that Sue took from one of Kate's letters to her was that Kate advised, "do stuff, travel and enjoy life when you're in your seventies – don't leave it to your eighties and beyond. You won't, or may not be able to do it thereafter".

Thankfully, with her usual steely determination and indomitable spirit, Kate continued to live her life on her terms to the age of 93.

When she passed away it was Kate's desire to be interred quietly and without great ceremony in a natural woodland burial ground near Tiverton, Devon. As always Kate never liked a fuss, especially when it was about her, but Dr. Kate Evans was a very special, wonderfully different and inspirational lady whose life, so well lived, deserves to be celebrated and always remembered. We will all miss her greatly.

A man is contacted by the police and informed he has done nothing criminal but his social media posts have offended someone. The police record his social media comments as a non-crime hate incident which may show up on his criminal record checks and affect his future employment. This may sound like something from Communist Russia, but this really happened in Britain only three years ago.

In a recent historic judgment, the Court of Appeal ruled that the College of Policing's guidance requiring non-crime hate incidents to be officially recorded by the police was an unlawful incursion to our freedom of expression.

As the trial judge noted, the man's tweets were "for the most part, either opaque, profane or unsophisticated", but this should not justify silencing his right to contribute to contentious political debates. The debate in question related to the relative importance of biological sex and self-declared gender identity in relation to single-sex spaces and sport. For some, this is an area of great contention but, whatever our views may be, we must have the right to freely express them.

The origin of police recording of non-crime hate incidents was well intentioned and came from the report into Stephen Lawrence's murder in 1993, which found institutional racism in the Metropolitan Police. As a result, racist incidents were defined as anything "perceived to be racist by the victim or any other person" and that non-crime incidents should be reported, recorded and investigated with the same commitment as real crimes. College of Policing guidance has since expanded to cover a number of other "protected characteristics" including gender.



Some police forces have even developed a track record for misinterpreting the law. For example, last February, Merseyside Police claimed that "being offensive is an offence".

In a world where the police don't have the resources to investigate non-crime incidents, partly because of the volume of reports generated by social media, the College of Policing tells police officers to record as hate incidents all those perceived by the person reporting them to be motivated by hostility, including unfriendliness or dislike.

This recent Court of Appeal judgment should be welcomed and has implications for freedom of speech which go way beyond policing: it rightly observes "how quickly some involved in the transgender debate are prepared to accuse others with whom they disagree of showing hatred, or as being transphobic when they are not".

We see this intolerance of different views everywhere: from Harry Potter actors condemning JK Rowling for her "hateful" views, to broadcasters or university students saying speakers should be "cancelled" for stating that biological sex is immutable.

There is no democracy without freedom of expression. In a world where it is possible to take offence at almost anything and everything, the police acting unlawfully to shut down legitimate political debate in 21st Century Britain should remind us that the most basic human rights should never be taken for granted.
