Rebecca moved into the village as a young girl with her mother Tanya, stepfather Nick and two older sisters, Katy and Emily, and then their younger brother Ben was soon to join the family.

In her too short a life Rebecca achieved much. Initially, and understandably, she attracted attention as a model. Later her long held joy of creating cakes and her artistic flare delighted those who attended the early days of Tuesday Teas which were held on a regular basis in the village hall. Tuesday Teas eventually became Badingham Café which has grown from this foundation of cake, community and compassion for those who just might need to drop in for a chat.

Rebecca's sensitivity and connection to the natural world helped her to use her artistic talent in the creation of beautiful jewellery inspired by her observations of the world around her. Her stand, selling her hand made pieces and fantastic smelling goats milk soap, was always a popular feature at the Christmas Fair.

Rebecca was laid to rest on the 12th July. Many came to say goodbye and through conversation there came the same reflective comments: beautiful; gentle; caring; tranquil, making everything seem better. We send our deepest sympathy to her family.

La Soiree Gourmande, held at the café a couple of weeks ago, was a great success. The food was fabulous, and everyone who was there would like to say a huge thank you to chef Thierry, Penny and members of their family who provided an amazing meal. Their work has been on display in Dennington Church since the Jubilee weekend and after the school's leavers assembly on 21st July it is being brought to Badingham Church where it will be displayed in the church chancel.

The chancel is open every day from 9am until 6 pm.

The Queen's Platinum Jubilee

Despite gloomy forecasts for the weather the Jubilee Celebrations went well and were very much enjoyed.

Our Beacon was lit on a perfect, calm and very atmospheric summer evening just a few metres from where the Coronation Beacon was lit 75 years ago.

A very meaningful service, led by the Rector, was followed by the dedication of the Jubilee Oak Tree in the church yard and, yes, the weather stayed dry, for a happy, community picnic in the church yard. Tea, cake and ice cream were available throughout and the village photo was taken.

Through the weekend and the following week there was an amazing display of photos of the Queen's 75 year reign in the church.

Thank you so much to everyone involved, including those who cut and strimmed the church yard grass, and a special thank you to Sonia Frost who co-ordinated everything.

Update on Church Roof Repairs

The process of raising the funds and obtaining permission to repair our church and have it fully open again is slow but we are making some progress.

Our Faculty (planning permission) from the Diocese, is moving on and Public Notices are on display on the church notice board, on the church door and inside the church chancel for the public to see exactly what permission we are applying for and how to raise objections, if they have any.

We are grateful to Suffolk Historic Churches Trust for a grant of £8,000 towards the approximate cost of £12,000 needed to buy the scaffolding which is supporting the roof and is currently costing £70 a week. The remaining cost will be funded from the Fabric Fund for the roof repairs.

A steering group are currently working on an Expression of Interest to The National Heritage Lottery Fund for a grant in excess of £500,000. If we are successful in this we will be invited to make a full application for the funds we need to repair the roof.

We appreciate the support of the village and visitors which is vital if we are to succeed in our mission of repairing our beautiful, unique and much loved village church and preserving its heritage for future generations.

Although the nave of the church is locked for safety reasons, please remember that the chancel is open every day between 9am and 6pm. Everyone is very welcome to call in for some quiet and peaceful moments during those hours.

NEWS FROM BADINGHAM PARISH COUNCIL

Please note that the next meeting of the Parish Council is deferred to August due to the Clerk's holidays and will be held on Thursday 25 August at 7pm.

At the AGM in May, Thomas Mountain was elected as the new Chair with Maurice Bowe as Vice-Chair. We wish them every success in their new roles. There are still 3 vacancies for co-opted members to become Parish Councillors and we urge you to consider joining the Parish Council. With some new blood and a keen interest in what is best for Badingham, we have much to do and would welcome some more input and enthusiasm onto the PC. You can always speak to any Councillor to see what it entails, contact the clerk, or look on our website: www.badingham.org.uk/councillors for a detailed description about what is involved.

As yet, no group has been in touch to update your pages on the new village website: www.badingham.org.uk. It will only be a focus for all the different groups in the village if you feed through information to the Clerk for updating your page and information. So please don't hesitate to email with content (and photos if possible) about your group so we can start to add these ASAP. Don't worry if you are not IT savvy, a phone call will do where we can talk through what you want to say. This is your VILLAGE website so we need your input to make it work.

The Annual Meeting of the Parish (APM) was held on Friday 20th May with a few members of the public in attendance. The draft minutes of this have been published and were on the notice board, consisting mainly of reports from various clubs and groups operating in the village.

New signage is up at Pocket Park, stating that dogs are not allowed in the park and that the emergency access is to be kept clear. Please help us by adhering to the signage.

Dog mess, as with many villages, is becoming an increasing problem. There are 3 dog bins in the village – opposite the Church, at the Rectory Road footpath and at the village hall. If you are not keen on poo bags, and we do understand that not everyone is in favour of these, especially when you see them hanging from hedges and such like, please use the 'Stick 'n Flick' method to move the dog mess off the roads and footpaths. This is actually an official strategy and the recommended method is to brush or sweep it into the undergrowth (e.g. away from public footpaths). The aim is to reduce the number of plastic carrier bags being left abandoned and discarded in urban and rural areas. There is no shortage of dog fouling laws in the UK but hanging poo-filled plastic bags from

bushes and trees has become commonplace in many areas and we must do all we can to discourage this behaviour.

We are investigating audio and visual equipment for the village hall so if you have any expertise in this field that you can help with, please get in touch with a Councillor or contact the clerk.

Lastly, the Jubilee celebrations went extremely well. We have some wonderful photos that will be uploaded to the website as soon as they are available. A large framed print will be ordered as a lasting memory to this one-off historical moment in time, to be hung in the village hall once the internal decorations are completed.

In order to get your queries to the people that can actually help you as quickly as possible, please find below contact information for issues with Suffolk Highways. The Parish Council will always try and help as a conduit but your initial contact should be with the correct authority.

Suffolk Highways can be contacted via the following methods: Telephone 0345 606 6171 or you can use their online Highways Reporting Tool for any of the following concerns via the following website: highwaysreporting.suffolk.gov.uk

FLY TIPPING

If you come across an incident of fly-tipping, please also report it direct to East Suffolk via their website: www.eastsuffok.gov.uk/waste/fly-tipping/how-to-report-fly-tipping or let the Parish Clerk know the full details so she can report it.

Fly tipping remains an issue in Suffolk as it does across the entire country, with more than four and a half thousand incidents reported last year alone. It costs hundreds of thousands of pounds to clear and this is paid for by Suffolk residents, as well as farmers and other landowners.

If illegally discarded, waste is traced back to the owner. If a licensed waste carrier hasn't been used to dispose of the waste, the owner will be fined even if it wasn't the owner who carried out the act of fly tipping. Members of the public and businesses are urged to usethe **SCRAP** code:

- Y Suspect ALL waste carrier
- Ÿ Check with the Environment Agency on 03708 506 506 that the carrier is licensed
- Ÿ Refuse unexpected offers to have waste taken away
- Ÿ Ask what will happen to your waste
- Ÿ Paperwork should be obtained get a full receipt

Badingham NHW Annual Report

It seems to have a quieter time than normal – at least as compared to 2019, when there were 21 reports of incidents. Some came via 'social media', passed on to me via co-ordinators or from the public. All reports are dealt with promptly.

Rural Wildlife Team

Contact PC Colin Taylor if you see or hear of problems – phone 111 and ask for Halesworth. There were many dog thefts during 2020-2021, particularly of gundogs, lurchers etc but these have now gone quiet, thankfully. We are asked to contact the R&W Team if we see or hear of anything suspicious, this time Sgt Brian Calver, again of Halesworth on 111.

Impersonation Scams

These have doubled over recent years. These criminals are expert at pretending to be from the bank or police – so remain vigilant. STOP and THINK – could it be fake? Put the phone down and ignore any suspicious requests. Report to Action Fraud on 0300 123 2040.

Oil Tanks

There have been thefts around the county – especially after dark, after tanks have been filled. Be aware.

Drones

I received a report of a black and red drone flying low over someone's property. This is an invasion of privacy. Reminder – you have a number of responsibilities when flying a drone. The majority of drones have to be registered and you must keep 150m away from residential areas when flying.

Footpaths

There have been problems with dogs off the lead and not under control. People are asked to keep their dogs on the lead if not walking to heel, to prevent problems with other dogs, walkers and wildlife. Respect is needed for the land on which you are walking and stick to the path to prevent crop damage. Clear your dog mess too!!

Burglaries

Operation Converter has been busy since launch in 2020, with many criminals appearing before Ipswich Crown Court.

Neighbourhood Watch

When I founded our NHW scheme there were 1000 such schemes, now 900. I have been a member of the United Strategy Group for over 30 years – all concerns go to the Government and Home Office. You can contact the Framlingham or Halesworth police dialling 101 and the control room will put you through – it may be easier and quicker to mention Sonja Russell and Badingham NHW – that should help.

Farm Machinery Security

This time of year, farmers are especially busy. Vehicles and plant kept outside should be locked and keys removed to meet insurance requirements. A few years ago, I happended to pass when someone was looking at some of our equipment in a field - a had a word and off they went. A tractor was sent for to remove them.

Gossip

It's about time some of those Nextdoor users stopped spreading gossip. It's not fair to anyone involved - that's how trouble starts and you could be held liable. Don't comment if you wouldn't say it to their face.

Volunteers

We badly need volunteers to cover each part of our spread out village – someone who can keep an eye on their plot. It's not arduous work and I am happy to help and give advice. We are looking for people to cover these routes: Mill View to Pound Corner (inc Twin Oak Drive) 2) Red House Road & New Road 3) Laxfield Road to the Priory 4) The Meadows & The Barn, Mill Road.

Finally, take care when on holidays - and don't let the world know that your home will be empty if you are going on your travels.

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A Visitor to our Garden

On a very wet weekend at the end of October, our two Great Danes, Buzz & Woody, 'found' a bird of prey in our garden. We thought it was a sparrowhawk. They chased it into a corner and it managed to hide from them but they were very interested in it. The next morning it was hanging about in our garden in the pouring rain, looking very bedraggled and calling out intermittently. Buzz & Woody were very keen to meet it again!

I put out some feelers on social media with some photos to see what our best plan of action was. Facebook and Instagram did not disappoint and before long I was talking to Peter, the 'Bird Man'. I explained about our visitor and he agreed that if we could capture the bird, he would come and get it and see what he could do.

Jules and I duly set out with a towel, a rake and an old cat basket - in the rain - trying to catch the bird. It wasn't flying properly but still managed to evade us for a while. Finally, we got it and decided to take it to Peter who lives on the outskirts of Ipswich.

When we arrived, Peter confirmed that it was in fact a juvenile male Kestrel, hereafter called Kevin. He was underweight and soaked through but Peter said he would feed him and see how he got on. There followed a tour of some aviaries housing peregrine falcons and barn owls, to name but a few. I am always uncomfortable with birds in captivity, but these were all victims of mostly human interactions (cars, fences etc) and would not have survived if left alone. There were even a pair of male barn owls, not suitable for release, who would hatch out eggs from damaged nests and the like. It was fascinating and Peter had many stories of rescues and strange finds.

We left Kevin with him, and agreed to get in touch to see how things went. Peter reported a week later that Kevin was feeding well, but still not very active. He thought that maybe he had flown into something and damaged his chest muscles. He planned to try him flying again the next weekend.

On Friday 12th Nov I had a message from Peter to say that Kevin was active and Peter felt he had done what he could and he was ready to go. He said that he and the wife, were going to take Kevin for a ride to Badingham later. They released Kevin in Mill Road (I think on one of the Kings' farm fields) that was newly planted. Kestrels will feed from the ground and, as the ground was recently turned over, this was helpful. Apparently, he flew all the way across the field and landed high in a tree the other side. Peter and 'the wife' then went for a very good lunch at The Queen in Dennington. Unfortunately, Peter said he was too slow to get any pictures of the release.

We keep looking for him, he is tagged so if anyone does find him (hopefully not) please do report it. I'm hopeful we might see him again one day and will keep looking. In the meantime, young Kevin, happy hunting and please don't come back and visit Buzz & Woody.
